and White played well but it was simply a case of a newly organized team going up against a squad of seasoned veterans. The ability was there but the team work itself showed bare in spots. It was certainly a game to give us hope and confidence in future conference prospects. When that time comes the best team without a doubt that we have had in years will fight for us on the diamond and what is more—fight successfully.

Daniels pitched a great game, getting 8 strike-outs to Gilplains 6 and allowing only 2 of the University men to amble to first. "Fuzzy" is improving every day, and his work Saturday brought praise from the lips of several of the big leaguers who were present. Lutz also showed up strong behind the plate. His work was a surprise to the fans who were mourning because of the absence of Shutt. Lutz's whip to second is exceptionally fast and sure. Graf and Gomer filled their positions perfectly and Clary and Hitchcock in the outer gardens got everything that came their way.

The batting of the Pomona team was rather weak. None of Gilplains twisters were connected with for bingles. Moreover they were well scattered and came at a time when they resulted in nothing but the man getting on base. Wight at third made a couple of bad errors but it was the result of nervousness not lack of ability. He will settle down before the season is far gone.

#### Boston Red Sox 7; Pomona 0

A large crowd of fans witnessed the game Monday afternoon with the Red Sox of the American League. To be frank most of them came out expecting to see a most terrible slaughter, likewise all were agreeably surprised. The Blue and White squad put up a fifty per cent better exhibition than they did against Stanford Saturday morning, and the score, 7-0 attests to that fact.

The team had to play faster, bet-

ter, harder ball in order to hold the big leaguers down to that number of tallies. It was an exhibition game, but a practice game as well and the members of the squad certainly assimilated considerable experience. Because of this the game was a great success. It is toward the conference championship that we are looking and these games are speeding us toward that goal.

The Red Sox came up from Pomona where they had been the city's guests of honor, a short time after lunch. Our squad had gone down in machines in order to escort them to the college.

Umpire Shutt called the game at 2:45, the adherents of the Ghost taking the field. Bedient and Williams were at the business end of the game for the "bean eaters" while Kingman started the work in the box for the home team with Lutz behind the plate. The game as in the conflict with Stanford was served up in the first inning, Gardner, the first man up, getting first on Daniels failure to connect properly with an easy ground ball down first baseline. Wight made a mess of Hooper's infield drive and Gardner came home on Lewis' long fly to deep center. Wight again offended allowing Hooper to make the second tally for Patsy Donovan's gang. One more point was garnered in the second, one in the third, the fifth and two in the sixth—making seven in all. Wagner got a neat double in the third and Speaker and Lewis each connected for a trip to the keystone sack in the sixth. Other than these the hits were fairly well scattered, yet they came when hits meant runs.

Kingman played a great game in the box for Pomona. He was touched for seven bingles to be sure, but he was playing the heady fielding game all the time. Lutz ably seconded him at the other end of the battery. He is improving all the time. Our hits were fairly well

scattered and rarely advanced a man. Only once did we have a chance to score, and that was in the sixth when Kingman tapped out the sphere for a two-bagger and then attempted to come home on Barnes' single.

Barnes went in for Jennings in the fourth and Kingman and Daniels alternated in the seventh. "Fuzzy" celebrated his advent by striking out three of the strangers from the city of beans and culture. In the two last innings, he fanned four and held them down securely to a single hit.

Our squad connected better with the horsehide than they did Saturday, having seven hits chalked up to the Red Sox 8. Barnes and Kingman got a couple apiece, Wight one, Lutz one, and Hitchcock one. Wight made two bad errors and Daniels on first did likewise. On the whole, however, it was an excellent game—one worth far more to the home squad perhaps than to anyone else. We have the team that is worth backing up, and our loyalty to it ought only to be measured by the love we bear for Pomona. The score.
